Assessment and Measurement

Dr. Sara Finney, serving as the chair of the Technical Advisory Committee for the GRE test, attended a three-day GRE Board meeting in Princeton, NJ. During this meeting discussions centered on outcomes assessment in higher education.

Dr. Keston Fulcher accepted an offer from the National Institute of Learning Outcomes Assessment (NILOA) to serve on its advisory panel. This is a progressive, world-leading organization in higher education. Serving on this panel will allow JMU to learn about the latest advancements in higher education and allow us to share our innovations with other leaders.

Dr. John Hathcoat gave a presentation to students in PSYC 651 at SIM University. In this virtual environment, students were assigned to serve as the director of a department in student affairs at a simulated university. As part of their position, they were asked to create an assessment plan. The presentation focused on introducing students to student outcomes assessment and how to write objectives.

Dr. Allison Ames was awarded the Office of Sponsored Programs New Faculty Award for high quality proposal seeking external funding during her first year at JMU.

CARS Talk

On February 24, **Dr. Craig Enders** (pictured) will be presenting "A Gentle Introduction to Multiple Imputation." The talk will be held in Lakeview 1104 from 10:00 am to Noon. Craig is a Professor at The University of California and has research and teaching interests in multiple imputation; maximum likelihood and Bayesian estimation with incomplete data; multilevel modeling; and longitudinal modeling. The purpose of this talk is to familiarize participants with multiple imputation and to demonstrate its use with the Blimp software application. The talk will be accessible to researchers with a foundation in multiple regression.

Nick Curtis, of the A&M Program, was appointed to the JMU-Kosovo Steering Committee.

Liz Pyburn, of the A&M Program, had a publication in the College Student Affairs Journal titled, "Birds of a feather cluster together: Noncognitive attributes and international student success." The work merges CARS assessment consultation with student research, and met a need requested by the Office of International Programs.

Assessment and Measurement/CARS has completed their faculty search. **Brian Leventhal**, who is coming from the University of Pittsburgh, will be starting July 1.



Clinical and School Psychology

Dr. Gregg Henriques is busily planning the Society for Theoretical and Philosophical Psychology's midwinter conference, which will be held in Richmond, VA in March. Several faculty and graduate students will be offering presentations, including two seminars on the C-I Madison Model of Training.

Dr. Henriques continues to advance his Well-Being Initiative, and gave a talk on it to the UREC Staff for their full-day retreat in January and will also discuss it as part of his Plenary Address for the Madison Leads Conference on January 28th.

Dr. Elena Savina is conducting research in Russia on using games with rules to promote self-regulation in preschool children.

Dr. Savina together with C-I students **Jennifer Mills, Kelly Atwood, and Jason Cha** published an article "Digital Media and Children: A Primer for School Psychologists" in the journal Contemporary School Psychology. This article provides school psychologists with a comprehensive literature review about the effects of digital media on various aspects of children's functioning including physical and mental health, attention, cognition, and socio-emotional development. School psychologists are provided with recommendations on how to incorporate information about digital media in their work with parents, educators, and youth in order to promote healthy digital media use.

Dr. Anne Stewart has been elected to Distinguished Fellowship of the National Academies of Practice in Psychology. Her induction will take place the weekend of March 17-18 in Philadelphia, PA.

Dr. Craig Shealy is the President-Elect for Division 52 of APA, International Psychology. He most recently attended their mid-winter meeting in Portland, Oregon.

Several C-I students will be attending and presenting at NASP in San Antonio, TX this February, including **Caroline Conners, Kirstin Drucker and Virginia Larsen**. **Dr. Elena Savina** will also be presenting at the conference.

The C-I Program's self-study was evaluated and the program was approved for a site visit that will occur during the spring of 2017.



High School Partnership




4VA Grant Awarded

Drs. Gilligan, Kielty, and Staton received a 4VA grant to develop a course "Mindfulness and Self-Care for Helping Professionals." This three-credit course will be offered during the first six weeks of the summer session. A description is provided below.

This course is designed for upper-undergraduate as well as graduate students who intend to work as a helping professional. It will enhance knowledge and skills related to self-care and wellness, specifically through the understanding and application of mindfulness-based contemplative practices. In addition to exploring the evidence-based literature in a variety of helping professional fields of study and practice, students will learn about the role of mindfulness in: burnout prevention; physical, mental, emotional and relational well-being; and personal and interpersonal meaning-making through both play and nature. Self-care and wellness modalities will be practiced in order to help professionals avoid burnout and to develop skills and attitudes that can help them thrive in their work. Finally, students will have the opportunity to explore their own professional identities in greater depth and to offer interdisciplinary education and best practices in a collaborative classroom environment.

If you have been following the JMU news, you may have seen a survey in which JMU alumni participated. The survey results were compared to results nationally and JMU alumni ranked high in overall well-being. The survey measured well-being on a number of different dimensions including workplace engagement, civic and community engagement, health and wellness, financial stability, and strong social relationships.
