Beginning at 8:10 and going until 8:35, volunteer readers have the opportunity to bring the excitement of reading to K-3 students before school starts. Literacy Chair Keston Fulcher works hard to continue the development of the program and ensure students are being exposed to a variety of books at any of the five elementary schools that are served in Harrisonburg City.

**Fort Defiance High School.** First years Jacqueline Billy, Stacey Davidson, Carleigh Fuhrman, and Sarah Lanyi served as reading mentors with 9th graders at Fort Defiance High School this past semester. These high school students have been identified to be reading below grade level. Each week, the students used paired reading and comprehension strategies to improve the students' reading fluency and comprehension. The first years looked forward to reading with their mentees every week.

5K Run/Walk for Autism. The Shenandoah Valley Autism Partnership put on Harrisonburg's Ninth Annual 5K Run/Walk to raise money for research and support of families with children who have Autism Spectrum Disorder.
