Dr. Jeff Dyche

Current Research

My lab is called the Sleep and Pharmacology Lab (formerly Sleep and Actigraphy Lab) where we study human sleep patterns and circadian rhythms using surveys and a sleep monitoring device called an actigraph that is worn on the wrist. I often collaborate with Prof. Holt and Prof. Fogler. Many of my students are also interested in the biological basis of behavior and behavior analysis. I usually have at least one graduate student in Experimental Psychology concentration of the Psychological Sciences MA program and that person runs the lab with the assistance of several undergraduates. There are opportunities for undergraduates to lead their own project which typically requires a two year commitment and joining the lab as a junior. Of course I also welcome seniors with research interests so a one year commitment is minimum requirement.

Specific Studies

In SPL we have investigated how chronic marijuana use impacts circadian rhythms compared to non-users. The most recent study examined the effect of chronic marijuana use on circadian function in humans and extend the knowledge surrounding marijuana's effect on neurocognition and sleep quality. Participants consist of chronic marijuana users and age-matched non-drug user controls. Participant substance abuse is verified through urine samples obtained at the initial and final visits. Participants wore actigraphs and maintained sleep diaries for 3 weeks and both marijuana users and non-users take the Automated Neuropsychological Assessment Metrics (ANAM) to measure cognitive performance. Preliminary data analyses reveal chronic marijuana use may act as a *zeitgeber* (time cue) and lead to increased entrainment in human users; however use may also result in slight cognitive impairment and significant sleep disturbance. We are replicating this marijuana study and completed it last year. We also are collaborating with Prof. Harvell-Bowman examining how sleep may modulate a number of factors in the Terror Management Theory literature. Another new project that we are starting in 2023-24 will examine how sex steroids like estrogen and progesterone impact biological rhythms and sleep quality. In the recent past, we have studied how napping impacts impulsivity and how sleep deprivation alters inflammatory markers in student volunteers.

Current Research

The Social Relationships Lab seeks to understand how social relationships with family members, friends, and romantic partners contribute to meaningful qualities of future relationships and individual adjustment. Students will have the opportunity to work from a longitudinal data set containing a multitude of developmental, social, and adjustment measures from annual assessments of individuals collected from ages 13 to 35.

Specific Studies

Current lab interests include (a) how family and peer relationship factors promote healthy vs. unhealthy romantic relationships and (b) how individual differences in emotion regulation and coping responses may influence the quality of family, peer, and romantic relationship development relationships. However, data are available to address a wide range of students' interests (see lists of student presentations on the lab website (https://socialrelationshipslab.weebly.com/), and students are encouraged to develop an individual project that fits with their interests.

By the end of the year, students will create a poster of their project that they will present at the JMU Psychology Student Research Symposium and the annual meeting of the Virginia Association for Psychological Science. Students may also have the option to submit their posters for presentation at a national-level conference.

Dr. Sri Siddhi N. Upadhyay

Current Research

As a cognitive psychologist, Dr. Upadhyay's research focuses on understanding the cognitive processes that inform reading. Discourse processing - or text and narrative comprehension - involves more than simply understanding the individual words on a page. Our mental representations for what we read build from the smallest units of language to the broadest higher-order representations, and include word and sentence level comprehension, memory, attention, and pragmatic information. Several broad questions guide Dr. Upadhyay's research: We know our memory for the information we read is not infinite; what captures our attention? In digital communication that lacks pragmatic cues, like tone of voice or facial expressions, how do we overcome this gap in communication? What other cues do we create or use to communicate via text or email? Currently, Dr. Upadhyay is focused on investigating digital communication, specifically how we read, process, and comprehend cues in text messaging. Several conference abstracts, posters, and manuscripts are in-progress for this line of research.
